As a nonpublic school serving youth with a variety of behavioral and emotional challenges, success doesn't always come easily. For Wendy, problems at home affected her behavior at school. Interacting with teachers and peers was a struggle and her grades suffered as a result. Wendy was not on track with her goals and her teachers were concerned that she would ultimately give up on herself and her progress.

Due to circumstances out of anyone's control, Wendy had to leave Renaissance for a while. When she returned, teachers and staff used this opportunity to give Wendy a fresh start, working together to build her individualized program to better suit her needs.

Thanks to the new approach, Wendy and her teachers began to build a relationship of trust. Wendy started to open up, participate more in class, and make connections with other students. When she had moments of distress, she began allowing staff to work with her to cope and deal with her issues in a positive manner, rather than acting out. Wendy was beginning to thrive at school.

Over the next year, Wendy's grades improved dramatically and she was experiencing fewer and fewer negative days. Her teachers shared that her sense of humor was blossoming and she was a joy to have in their classes.

As a model student, Wendy was given the opportunity to participate in our workforce training program in one of the most coveted positions. She took to her new role almost immediately and enjoyed her new responsibilities.

At the end of her senior year, Wendy received straight "A's" on her report card, earned her high school diploma, and got to walk in the ceremony with her graduating class something she didn't think was possible just a couple of years prior!

Wendy's teachers are so incredibly proud of her accomplishments, but most importantly, Wendy is proud of herself and all that she has overcome. Although it wasn't an easy journey, Wendy has now taken control of her own life by entering an independent living program where she lives locally with a roommate and applies the skills she learned in our workforce training program to her current employment.

The program director, CC Schumm, added, "We must admit that we are proud of the young woman Wendy has become. Our girl is doing so well."

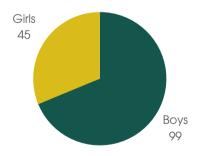

INTRODUCING: RENAISSANCE **RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM**

The Renaissance Residential Program (RRP) at Haynes is a nationally accredited California program for both local and out-of-state male students aged 12-17 who are:

- On the diploma track with an Individualized Educational Plan (IEP)
- Struggle with emotional and/or behavioral challenges

As the premier provider of nonpublic school education in the area, RRP participants attend our integrated educational program, Renaissance Community Prep located on the David & Margaret campus, where students work closely with credentialed teachers to follow Individualized Educational Plans (IEPs) based on their goals.

While at home on the Haynes Family of Programs campus, youth have access to supportive services such as counseling, case management, vocational training, and recreational activities while living in our fully supervised, home-like cottages.

We are proud to offer this unique program that combines our expertise in both specialized education and trauma-informed residential care to provide an alternative option for students and families struggling in traditional school settings.

RENAISSANCE RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM INCLUDES:

- Therapeutic and trauma-informed residential care
- Integrated nonpublic school through Renaissance Community
- · Intensive mental health counseling, including individual, group, and family therapy
- Case management services

At S.T.A.R. Academy, our goal is to make a difference in the lives of children and youth with special needs by providing supportive services based on their individual needs. Today, we are proud to share the incredible success story of Derrek, a young student whose progress exemplifies the impact we can make through our dedicated support and services.

Derrek's story began in December 2020 when we first started working with his family. As a 9th grader diagnosed with autism and other intellectual disabilities, Derrek faced numerous obstacles on his path to success. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, he had not received any services or education for the past six months. Derrek's mother, overwhelmed by the challenge of providing for him on her own, reached out to us for help.

Initially, virtual services were the only option available for Derrek. However, his limited attention span made it extremely challenging for him to engage in these sessions. Despite the difficulties, our team persisted, striving to find a solution that would truly benefit Derrek. In April 2021, we offered in-person services, but Derrek's mother believed it was best to continue with virtual sessions due to his severe behaviors.

Throughout the months that followed, Derrek's journey took unexpected turns. First, he was unable to attend school physically due to a lack of adequate behavior support. Then, tragedy struck the family in October 2021 when Derrek's father passed away, and Derrek himself required hospitalization for a mental health emergency. Services were put on hold as the family coped with these devastating circumstances.

Despite the setbacks, our team maintained contact with Derrek's mother, ensuring she knew we were there to support her when the time was right. Fast forward to January 2023, and we received three new contracts for Derrek. This time, there was an incredible piece of news to celebrate - Derrek had moved into a group home, where his behaviors had significantly improved.

The impact of our providers became evident in the joy and progress Derrek displayed. The director of the group home shared how Derrek eagerly awaited the arrival of his occupational therapist, Ms. Kristine, running to his room to put on his shoes and wearing a smile that radiated happiness. Remarkable progress was seen in his active participation during therapy sessions.

Not only did Derrek's behavior improve, but the staff at the group home also commended all three of our service providers for their dedication, knowledge, and patience. They affirmed that our providers' commitment and genuine love for their work were instrumental in Derrek's achievements.

With these positive outcomes, the director expressed hope for continued collaboration, as Derrek flourishes with the support of S.T.A.R. Academy services. Their wish to have all three providers return to work with Derrek exemplifies the profound impact our team has had on his development.

Derrek's journey, though filled with challenges, demonstrates the transformative power of dedicated support and interventions. At S.T.A.R., we are incredibly proud to have been a part of his progress. His story serves as a reminder that with the right resources, care, and determination, individuals with special needs can overcome obstacles and thrive. Together, let us continue making a difference in the lives of those we serve and create more success stories like Derrek's.

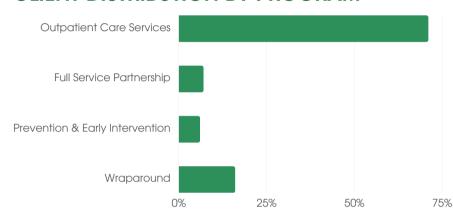




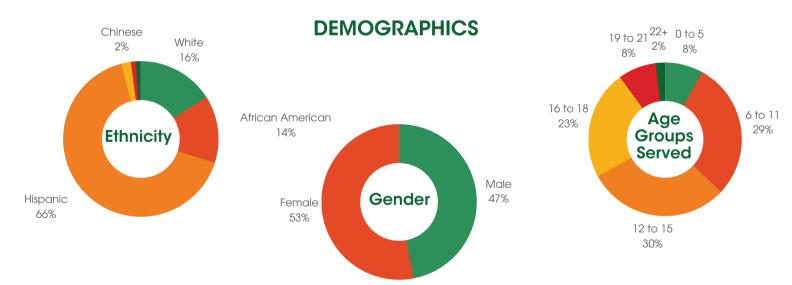
MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

CLIENT DISTRIBUTION BY PROGRAM



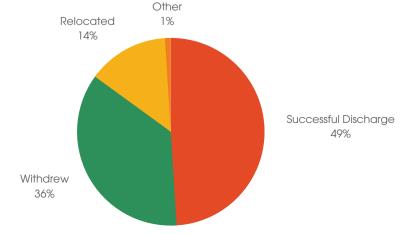
The majority of our clients, accounting for 71%, have benefitted from our Outpatient Care Services. 16% of our clients have engaged in Wraparound Services and 7% in our Full Service Partnership, ensuring they receive intensive, community-based treatment and support. Additionally, 6% of our clients have accessed our Prevention & Early Intervention services, allowing us to proactively address mental health concerns and provide early support to individuals and families.



REASONS FOR DISCHARGE

Haynes Family of Programs is dedicated to providing exceptional support and care to those in need. However, we recognize the challenges and complications that can impede the mental health journey, including withdrawal, relocation, and other life changes.

We are proud to report that a remarkable 49% of individuals successfully completed their treatment plans, demonstrating the effectiveness and impact of our mental health services.

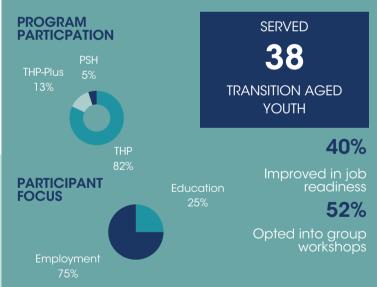

NEW BEGINNINGS

The purpose of the New Beginnings program is to provide care, supervision, mental health and medical services, education, and case management to the unaccompanied youth in our care. Reunification with a verified and approved sponsor, usually a relative or family friend, is the top priority for youth entering the program.

Youth in the New Beginnings program living at David & Margaret also attend school on campus, participate in recreational activities, and go on outings around the surrounding areas.

By far, the favorite activity for youth on campus is soccer. Given the diversity of the New Beginnings population, soccer is one thing that most youth have in common. In a letter written by a youth who was discharged to a sponsor in the US, he wrote: "Continue with soccer, it is our love" and expressed his desire for program staff to continue the tournaments with new youth entering the program.

We are proud to report that 92% of discharged youth went to verified and approved sponsors within the US this past fiscal year.

Before discharge and 30 days post-discharge, surveys are conducted to gauge satisfaction from youth and sponsors with the New Beginnings program. Over 97% of youth and sponsors responded positively to questions regarding respect from program staff, feeling safe in the program, respect for their culture and religion, and feeling satisfied with the services they received.

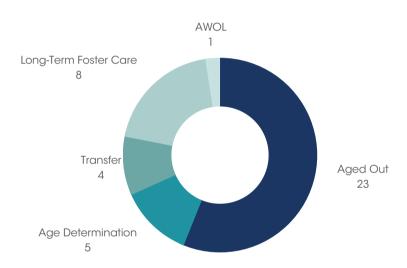

Over the course of the past fiscal year, our foster care and adoption agency had the privilege of serving a total of 30 children. This number reflects the significant impact we have made in their lives, by providing them with love, care, and stability during an uncertain time in their lives.

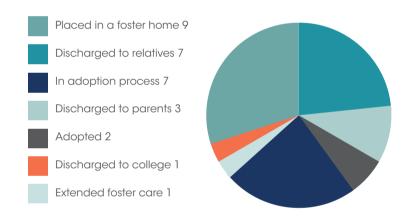
It is with great pride that we highlight the positive outcomes achieved during this period, as we were able to successfully discharge seven children to relatives, three to their parents, and two were joyfully adopted into their forever homes. Furthermore, our dedication to finding permanent families for children in need is evidenced by the seven youths who are currently undergoing the process of adoption.

We are also proud to report that one youth successfully transitioned from our care to a 4-year college in Louisiana, and another continues to receive support through extended foster care while pursuing their educational aspirations at a local community college.

Our commitment to serving the varying and often marginalized demographics is evident through the successful placement and support of four sibling groups and two teenagers, whose unique needs and circumstances made finding suitable and loving homes more challenging.

These outcomes clearly demonstrate the importance of our work and speak to the pressing need for increased involvement in foster care. Through the continued support of our valued community members and resource families, we can inspire even more individuals to #GetAttached and make a profound difference in the lives of these young individuals who deserve love and stability.

LONG-TERM FOSTER CARE

When youth enter the United States without a parent or guardian, they are placed in programs like New Beginnings to begin the search for sponsors, usually a family member, within the country. When those searches are unsuccessful, youth are then transferred to our Long-Term Foster Care (LTFC) program. In the LTFC program, social workers begin the search for host families where youth will be placed for long-term care.

Our LTFC program has made significant strides over the past year, positively impacting the lives of 32 children in our community. We are proud to share that we increased our bed capacity from 20 to 25 in July, allowing us to serve even more vulnerable children in need. Furthermore, we have expanded our team by hiring a new social worker/case manager in January and a new clinician, allowing us to provide comprehensive and specialized care to our children.

In addition to our staffing improvements, we are thrilled to have approved one new home in our long-term foster care program, enabling us to provide a loving and stable environment for yet another child in need. We are also excited to announce that we have submitted an application to increase our bed capacity to 32, allowing us to further expand our reach and impact.

As we reflect on these outcomes, we are truly grateful for the trust and support of our donors and stakeholders who have made all these achievements possible. With your continued support, we can make an even greater difference in the lives of the children we serve.

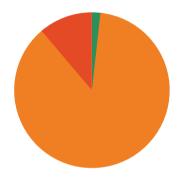

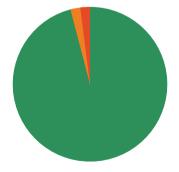

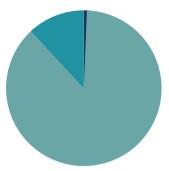

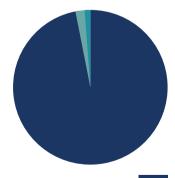
